Lost Media

Outreach Coordinator Mackenzie Herold explores media preservation.

I watched a lot of cartoons as a kid.

From Hanna-Barbera classics to modern teen sitcoms, there was always something on TV to keep me entertained. If we're being honest, I watched some of these shows so many times that I can now recite them by heart (looking at you, Scooby-Doo).

If you had to entertain kids in the early 2000s, chances are that you have heard the Disney Channel theme song. It's a little thing that played between the regularly scheduled programming. It was often accompanied by one of Disney's stars trying to draw an outline of Mickey Mouse.



In late 2022, documentarian Kevin Perjurer released his magnum opus: "Disney Channel's Theme: A History Mystery." What started as a hunt to find the uncredited composer of the Disney Channel jingle became an exploration into preservation, artistry, and the legacies that we leave behind.

This documentary also propelled a little-known subculture into the public eye. For the first time, the general public learned about the digital detectives that made it their mission to recover "lost media."

What is lost media?

Simply put, it's any form of media that has been lost to time. Films, music, art, books: the list goes on. Whether they have intentional destruction or by accident, these works have disappeared.

What these internet sleuths set out to find as many lost works as they can. They established dedicated chat spaces where they brainstorm,

post resources, and share a mutual passion that creates a real-world impact.

In some ways our work at BCHS follows a similar vein to that of these digital detectives Every day we deal with unidentified media; objects that are in our collections but have no information attached to them. Over the years, donations have been accepted without being properly cataloged or stored, so now our work consists of locating and identifying these pieces.

For some items, this job is easier said than done. Photos and negatives are notoriously hard to identify if they weren't originally entered into a museum cataloging system. And all too often we find loose photos that were removed from their numbered files years ago, or improperly stored objects that have been destroyed by mold.



It can be frustrating for all of us involved in this preservation process, especially when we come across an artifact that we *know* must be important but has no attached or cross-referenced information. It's like searching for a needle in a haystack, or in this case, a photo amongst thousands.

Preservation work is tedious. It's frustrating and time-consuming. It can even make you feel like tearing your hair out.



But when you take the time to do it properly, the rewards are tremendous. Sometimes you're able to find long-forgotten documents that solve a decades long puzzle. Other times, you're able to pull a photo of someone's great-grandfather from the archive.

Preservation is a lot like a treasure hunt. You have to do a lot of digging to finally find gold. It takes a whole team of people, a passionate community, and a lot of organization to keep the unidentified media that we

have from becoming lost media. If we don't preserve it now, it will be lost to time. And we cannot rely on the good Samaritans on the internet to help us find it again.
